People Learn Hazards of Drilling

Report From the Great North Woods

Well, this month I thought I might just catch everybody up on what is going on in the Northwest portion of the state. I will touch on a few topics of particular interest to us environmentalists in the Northwest corner of Pennsylvania.

Early in October, Saturday October 3rd, I and a few members of my outdoors club, the Allegheny Outdoor Adventure Group, joined some great people across the border in Allegany State Park, New York (ASP) for a hike and an environmental lecture. (There are five different spellings for "Allegheny.")

The hike was hosted by a coalition of outdoor groups called "The Friends Allegany," who focused their attention on a pristine area in the ASP, namely the Blacksnake Mountain area that is planned to be drilled by US Energy. Just south of the NY/PA line, US Energy has drilled several wells and has caused problems in several different areas.

In Pennsylvania, US Energy has already been given over \$200,000 in fines by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection and caused "water problems" in the Hedgehog Hollow and Interstate Parkway areas in Bradford. Water wells in those areas (especially Hedgehog) are undrinkable and in one case, the water actually will light on fire!

US Energy is apparently going to start drilling in the Allegheny State Park and will likely do their "typical" grid of an oil and/or gas well every 500 feet or so. It will completely destroy a very pristine area favored by many hikers and naturalists.

Dr. Laurence T. Beahan of the Sierra Club's Niagara Group said, "It's absolutely frightening to have this company that played so fast and loose with the environment in the Allegheny National Forest come to Allegheny State Park."

As of right now, the plans to

drill are held up, while the Attorney General of New York State checks out their proclaimed "ownership" of mineral rights. Apparently US Energy didn't really have clear title to mineral rights they thought, or said, they owned.

The hike we attended was led by Jay Wopperer and Larry Beahan. Some of the groups represented were the Sierra Club the Adirondack Mountain Club and the Allegheny Outdoor Adventure Group, as well as others whose names I didn't catch. The hike was attended by some 60 people, thanks to about 30 members of a boy scout troop that also participated.

The Bradford Water Authority (BWA) in Bradford, Pennsylvania was created many years ago (before the turn of the century, 1881) to protect Bradford's water supply. The Bradford Water Authority had the foresight to set up several reservoirs to provide water to the expanding Bradford area. They have three reservoirs the size of lakes and two smaller other ones, for a total of five reservoirs. They also own all the land around them that drains into the reservoirs.

Bradford City Water Authority is unique in the fact that the Authority owns and controls the 12,000 acres that comprise the watershed. It's the largest contiguous privately owned piece of real estate in the state of Pennsylvania! We take our water seriously here in Bradford!

Fast forward to 2008 when US Energy started drilling what might end up to eventually be hundreds of wells on the watershed.

The BWA owns some or most of the mineral rights, but not all. And a lot of acres of mineral rights ended up in the hands of US Energy and, despite the critical role the watershed plays in the lives of the residents of Bradford (our drinking water for God's sake!), they continue to practice sloppy drilling and hydrofracking methods. So far they have racked up over \$200,000 in fines!

Switching gears . . . The Marcellus Shale Gas Rush!

Luckily, around here the Marcellus Shale layer is a bit thin — maybe too thin for any great gas production. So far the rumors we are hearing are that the few Marcellus wells that were put in are not really paying out as expected; but they are putting more wells in, east and southeast of us, around Potter County and points east and south of there.

One problem — probably the biggest — is the used fracking materials and brine water (that come back out of the drilled well after hydrofracking) are being trucked all the way west on Route 6, from Potter County to Warren, Pennsylvania, one of the few places in the state that is allowed

Greenland Ice Cap Melt Accelerating

BRISTOL, United Kingdom, November 12, 2009 (ENS) — Satellite observations and a state-of-the-art regional atmospheric model have independently confirmed that the Greenland ice sheet is losing mass at an accelerating rate, reports a new study by a team of British, Dutch and American scientists.

The total 2000–2008 mass loss of about 1,500 gigatons is equivalent to 0.46 millimeters per year of global sea level rise, the scientists said.

This loss of mass is equally distributed between increased iceberg production, driven by acceleration of Greenland's fast-flowing outlet glaciers and increased meltwater production at the ice sheet surface.

Professor Jonathan Bamber from the Bristol Glaciology Centre at the University of Bristol and an author on the paper said, "It is clear from these results that mass loss from Greenland has been accelerating since the late 1990s and the underlying causes suggest this trend is likely to continue in the near future."

"We have produced agreement between two totally independent estimates, giving us a lot of confidence in the numbers and our inferences about the processes," said Bamber, a glaciologist who has done previous studies of the melting tak-

ing place in Antarctica.

Mass budget calculations were validated with satellite gravity observations from the twin Gravity Recovery and Climate Experiment (GRACE) satellites, enabling the scientists to quantify the individual components of the recent Greenland mass loss.

The gravity variations that GRACE studies include changes due to surface and deep currents in the ocean and exchanges between ice sheets or glaciers and the oceans.

Warm summers in the period 2006–2008 have further accelerated the mass loss to 273 gigatons per year, said Bamber, explaining that one gigaton is

the mass of one cubic kilometer .621 cubic miles) of water.

This represents 0.75 millimeters of global sea level rise per year, he said.

If it all melted, the Greenland ice sheet contains enough water to cause a global sea level rise of seven meters (23 feet), Bamber said.

Since 2000, the ice sheet has lost about 1,500 gigatons in total, representing on average a global sea level rise of about half a millimeter per year, or five millimeters since 2000.

At the same time that surface melting started to increase around 1996, snowfall on the ice sheet also increased at about

Endgame by Derrick Jensen

Hailed as the "Philosopher Poet" of the ecological movement, Derrick Jensen passionately explains how our industrial civilization and the persistent and widespread violence it requires, cannot last. He weaves history, philosophy, psychology, environmentalism, economics and literature into an intricate pattern of truth and resistance. The 2006 Press Action Award called Jensen's two-volume *Endgame* "the best work of nonfiction in 2006. *Endgame* is the most important book of the decade and could stand as the must-read book of our lifetimes."

I often give talks at universities and elsewhere. I gave one such talk last week. Just before I walked on stage, the person who brought me there whispered, "I forgot to tell you but I publicized this as a speech about human rights. Can you make sure to talk about that?"

I nodded agreement, although I had no idea what to say. Everything that came to me was tepid, along the lines of "Human rights are good." I may as well say I'm for apple pie and the girl next door. Even though I didn't tell her this, I think she read my face. She smiled nervously. I smiled twice as nervously back. It's a good thing we weren't playing poker.

She went out to introduce me. I thought and thought and wished there were a lot more upcoming events for her to talk about. I wished she would start announcing the day's major league baseball scores. I wished she would forecast the weather and tell the fortunes of the people in the front row. But she didn't do any of that and soon enough it was my turn.

As I walked on stage, however, I suddenly knew what I had to say, and was reminded, as I often am, how quickly the mind can work under pressure, or at least how quickly it can work those times it doesn't seize up altogether.

"Most people," I said, "who

care about human rights and who talk about them in a meaningful fashion, as opposed to those who use them as a smoke-screen to facilitate production and implement policies harmful to humans and non-humans, usually spend a lot of energy demanding the realization of rights those in power give lip service to. Sometimes they expand their demands to include things — like a livable planet — people don't often associate with human rights. People have a right to clean air, we say, and clean water. We have a right to food. We have a right to bodily integrity. Women (and men) have the right to not be raped. Some even go so far as to say that non-humans, too, have the right to clean air and water. They have the right to habitat. They have the right to continued existence."

People nodded. Who but a sociopath or a capitalist — insofar as there is a difference — could disagree with any of these?

"But," I continued, "I'm not sure that's the right approach. I think that instead of adding rights we need to subtract them."

Silence. Frowns. The narrowing of eyes.

"No one," I said, "has the right to toxify a river. No one has the right to pollute the air. No one has the right to drive a



creature to extinction, nor destroy a species' habitat. No one has the right to profit from the labor or misery of another. No one has the right to steal resources from another."

They seemed to get it. I continued, "The first thing to do is recognize in our own hearts and minds that no one has any of these rights because clearly, on some level, we do perceive others as having them or we wouldn't allow rivers to be toxified, oceans to be vacuumed and so on. Having become clear ourselves, we then need to let those in power know we're taking back our permission, that they have no right to wield this power the way they do because clearly, on some level, they, too, perceive themselves as having

the right to kill the planet or they wouldn't do it. Of course they have entire philosophical, theological and judicial systems in place to buttress their perceptions. As well as, of course, bombs, guns and prisons. And then, if our clear statement that they have no right fails to convince them — and I wouldn't hold my breath here — we'll be faced with a decision: How do we stop them?"

A lot of people seemed to agree. Then after the talk someone asked me, "Aren't these just different ways of saying the same thing?"

I wasn't sure what she meant. "What's the difference between saying I have the right to not be raped and saying to some man, 'You have no right to

rape me?'"

I was stumped. Maybe, I thought, my mind actually had seized up, only so completely that I hadn't known it. The reason the words had come so quickly is because they were just a recapitulation of the obvious. I have a few male friends who routinely take something someone else says, change a word or two or invert the sentence structure and then claim it as their own great idea. I've been known to do that myself. But then I realized there's an experiential difference between these two ways of putting it. A big one.

Pretend you're in an abusive relationship. Picture yourself saying to this other person, "I have the right to be treated with respect." Now, that may developmentally be important for you to say but there comes a point when it's no longer appropriate to keep the focus on you — you're not the problem. Contrast how that former statement feels with how it feels to say: "You have no right to treat me this way." The former is almost a supplication, the latter almost a command. And its focus is on the perpetrator.

For too long we've been supplicants. For too long the focus has been on us. It's time we simply set out to stop those who are doing wrong.

Before I go any further, I

need to be clear that it's not up to all of us to dismantle the system. Not all of us need to take down dams, factories, electrical infrastructures. Some of us need to file timber sale appeals, some need to file lawsuits. Some need to work on rape crisis hot lines and some need to work at battered women's shelters. Some need to help family farmers or work on other sustainable agriculture issues. Some need to work on fair trade and some need to work on stopping international trade altogether. Some need to work on decreasing birth rates among the industrialized and some need to give all the love and support they can to children (I've heard it said that the most revolutionary thing any of us can do is raise a loving child).

One of the good things about everything being so f*%#\$ed up — about the culture being so ubiquitously destructive — is that no matter where you look — no matter what your gifts, no matter where your heart lies — there's good and desperately important work to be done. Know explosives? Take out a dam. Know how to love and accept children, how to teach them to love themselves, to think and feel for themselves? That's what you need to do.

If you agree with my premises and arguments, yet find your-

BOULDER, Colorado — Here's what this affluent Rocky Mountain city of 100,000 does about a revenue shortfall in the darkest economic hour since the Great Depression:

It raises its carbon tax.

The city just west of Denver was the first in the nation to slap a levy on carbon emissions so it could meet Kyoto Protocol obligations.

As it became apparent this summer the city was slipping and needed more cash to revitalize emissions-cutting programs, town leaders raised the modest tax — tacked to city utility bills — to its maximum.

With diplomatic efforts to seal a post-Kyoto accord approaching a decidedly uncertain fate this December in Copenhagen, state and local leaders pushing their own emissions reductions efforts see only one choice: Proceed.

The number of cities and regional governments undertaking this transition to a low-carbon economy is growing. These efforts, leaders vow, will continue whatever the outcome of political debates in Copenhagen, Brussels or Washington, D.C.

There are, in other words, two trains heading out of the station: Those driving local change are confident their programs will continue to accelerate even if Copenhagen next month.

"The community is on board with this," said Sarah Van Pelt, author of Boulder's climate action plan who is now a special projects coordinator for the city's environmental division. "Right now our biggest detractors are saying why aren't we doing enough?"

San Diego is tying recycling, water use and energy efficiency to climate; Berkeley, California has rewritten property rules to boost solar installations; New York and California are shifting state policy to encourage a new, low-carbon economy. Twenty-nine other states have some sort of a renewable fuel standard, requiring utilities to mix a certain percentage of those fuels into their power mix.

"If nothing happens on the federal level, it's unfortunate but it's not the end of the world," said Cara Martinson, legislative analyst for the California State Association of Counties. "We'll start to see a lot more of these regional activities. It'll start to be a bottom-up approach if the national framework breaks down."

Need for a Global Solution

Whether these local efforts can produce the reductions required to avert the worst climate disruption is much debated. Many climate experts are skeptical. The necessary cuts are substantial — they require economy-wide transformation and the initiatives need to be policed by a fixed, enforceable global treaty.

"It's hard to see how they could be sufficient," said Doug Boucher, director of tropical forests and climate initiative at the Union of Concerned Scientists.

A lot of this stuff might be put on the far back burner for a while.

The Copenhagen talks are seen as crucial for several reasons. It's the date the interna-

tional community — after years of negotiations — set as the time to draw up a comprehensive global solution to climate disruption.

Industry and governments need to know where emissions targets are headed post-Kyoto. December is the last chance to get a treaty ratified and in place before Kyoto expires in 2012, said Jennifer Morgan, director of the World Resources Institute's climate and energy team, who has been involved in global climate talks for more than a decade.

Local efforts help, she agreed. But the global problem needs a global solution.

"It's a huge problem around the share of the commons in the atmosphere and it's a very large economic issue," she said. "Countries need to have a sense that other main contributors to the problem — and their competitors — are moving together toward a solution.

"It's more than just the sum of the parts."

California, even more than Boulder, exemplifies local determination to curb emissions regardless of national or international stalemate. The state of 37 million people agreed in 2006 to tackle global warming. It has a mandatory greenhouse gas reporting system covering 90 percent of the state's industrial emissions. By law, the state has to ratchet those emissions down to 1990 levels by 2020 — a 24 percent cut from business-as-usual projections.

But scientists say the world needs to slash emissions 80 percent by 2050 to avoid catastrophic climate change. Boulder hasn't met Kyoto's modest target of a 7 percent cut over 1990 levels despite its tax and one of the nation's most eco-conscious populations, though city leaders say they expect to get close.

California faced a \$26 billion spending hole earlier this summer that it filled in part by pulling money from local governments. While the state managed to protect many of its climate programs, local efforts aren't so lucky.

"A lot of this stuff might be put on the far back burner for a while," Martinson acknowledged.

California's municipalities, in

fact, aren't seen as "agents of reduction" under the state's framework. There's no emissions bar under which cities must slip by a certain date.

"We are looking to forward-thinking municipalities to come up with innovative solutions," said Stanley Young, spokesman for the California Air Resources Board's climate programs.

"They're more nimble, certainly, than the state. In a sense they're able to be the test bed for these new approaches."

But at this point, he said, "it's all voluntary."

Nuts and Bolts of Emissions Cuts

Still, cities are laying an important foundation that must be in place regardless of the target ultimately set by global leaders: They're figuring out the nuts and bolts of how to cut emissions.

"Demand-side reduction requires sophisticated implementation. It needs to show up at the local level and show up for the end-user," said Steve Pomerance, the former Boulder City Councilman who helped write Boulder's carbon tax earlier in the decade.

It's no surprise that Boulder would take the lead here.

The city is affluent — near the top 10 percent in the United States in per-capita income, according to the U.S. Census Bureau — and brainy. The University of Colorado, the National Center for Atmospheric Research and several other research institutions make the city a hub for science and innovation, repeatedly propelling the city to the top of Forbes' annual list of America's smartest cities.

It's also a green city, with a network of dedicated bike and hiking trails and the nation's oldest open-space program hemming development. Trails, sun, snow and mountains draw a young, outdoorsy demographic that boasts one of the most liberal voting records in the West.

In 1982 the city limited building heights that shaded lots to the north to preserve solar access on the neighboring lot. In 1987, long before most city councils had heard of global warming, the city reassessed its water plan to account for lower runoff expect-

ed in a warmer climate. It bought a crucial upstream reservoir to secure extra storage.

In 2002, with the Bush Administration stalling, Boulder decided it would meet the Kyoto protocol and the council quickly concluded it needed a way to pay for the necessary climate change programs. Many argued for a fee, which didn't require voter approval.

Pomerance, a key player in both the solar-shading law and the reservoir purchase, pushed for a tax. "Go to the voters. Say straight out here's what you want to do," Pomerance said in an interview. "That way you have a mandate. (Otherwise) you're always swimming upstream politically."

In 2006, 60 percent of Boulder's voters approved the tax.

And the city discovered the hard work had just begun.

The tax is modest — \$11 a year tacked to a typical household's energy bill. This summer the council raised the levy to its maximum, \$21 per year for the average household. It will bring in \$1.8 million next year.

The best we can expect from Copenhagen is targets. It doesn't solve problems. It just forces you to start figuring out how to deal with them.

The city offered home energy audits. It pushed biofuels and rooftop solar. It discounted energy-efficient lighting, furnaces and insulation. And six years in, the city found emissions have grown instead of shrunk.

That's the true difficulty in solving climate change, Pomerance says: World leaders can agree on targets. They can agree on a cap. But then what?

"That's just the first eighth-inch on top of a 10-foot pile of pieces. There's all these other pieces that have to go along with it," Pomerance said. "I'm a local politico. All I'm looking at is the implementation — 'OK, that's fine, now what do we do?'"

San Diego has taken a whack at that question, too.

Almost two years ago a coalition of environmental groups, utilities and government agencies decided to combine various conservation and efficiency campaigns into one umbrella marketing effort — Stand for Less.

Nowhere on the campaign's Web site or advertising materials are the words "global warming" or "greenhouse gas emissions." Instead, the focus is on using less, recycling more, saving water, consolidating errands.

The goal, said Mark Oldfield, a spokesman for the state's Department of Conservation, which is coordinating the effort, is to see whether by tackling these very concrete efforts, a more abstract goal — California's climate change objectives — can be achieved.

"It's a very simple metric," Oldfield said. "We didn't want to make it brain surgery. We wanted to look at it and see clear-cut numbers."

The program is in its infancy. It has set no targets and its survival is questionable: After spending \$1 million on start-up and an initial media campaign, the department saw its advertising budget slashed as California worked its way out of a budget hole.

"Our effort in San Diego is somewhat limited," Oldfield acknowledged. "We can't impact a lot of things directly."

"But we're hoping that by tar-

geting recycling and other things, we can impact indirectly some bigger things."

And this is where an international agreement could truly help, said Morgan, WRI's climate director.

"Local initiatives working very specifically and practically on engaging unions and companies and policy makers in making those shifts are absolutely essential," she said during a telephone interview from the Bonn climate talks earlier this summer.

"You also need to have a national policy. It makes the local job easier — 'If you go for renewables, then you get these tax incentives.'"

"And on the international level, you get a level of ambition that the country is going to work on this with the rest of the world," she added. "It's really about making people see the interdependencies that exist."

Plenty of Work

Local leaders certainly don't mean global efforts should be underestimated.

Back in Boulder, city leaders already are looking for goals beyond 2012, when Kyoto expires. Its ability to establish a post-Kyoto target, said Jonathan Koehn, the city's environmental affairs manager, will depend "most certainly" on the city's ability to decarbonize the energy supply.

And that will require an international push.

"We can meet our current target with energy efficiency (measures) and Boulder residents making differences in their everyday lives," he said. "But to move beyond that we have to move on a different playing field."

"It doesn't mean we stop the local efforts," Koehn added. But the consequence of failure in Copenhagen would likely be a prolonged onset of "meaningful and widespread" changes in the near future.

Of course, that near future holds plenty of work — and change — for local governments, with or without a framework.

"The best we can expect from Copenhagen is targets," Pomerance said. "It doesn't solve problems. It just forces you to start figuring out how to deal with them."

"The high-level targets need to be connected to plans on the ground," he added.

"What's going to happen is Congress puts in cap-and-trade and they're going to crank (carbon limits) down by 2050 — or hopefully sooner — and issue zero permits to coal plants. And the utilities will say, 'Well, what's step two?'"

"That's where the issue is going to show up. What it's going to eventually come down is plan," Pomerance said. "And what it's ultimately going to come down to is what are cities going to do, what are counties going to do, what are states going to do?"

"They Had to Destroy the Planet to Save It."

This title is a reference to the often-heard phrase during the Vietnam War, which so well expresses the insanity of war. In those days it spoke of destroying the "village." Who would have ever thought it might one day apply to the whole Planet Earth?

Today, a day in November 2009, as I write, I look out my window in eastern New York State, to a blue Sky, slowly being covered with intentionally-laid trails, which expand into cirrus-like "clouds" and will soon combine to veil the Sky and occlude the Sun.

Fueled by my fury I intend to expose this visible theft — this suffocation — of the Earth's Natural Processes, its Beauty and its Innocence. And further, to expose the jarring reality of weather warfare, which is more broadly atmospheric warfare.

It was in February of 2008 that I had my sad epiphany. For years — since the mid-1990s — I had been photographing the pluming contrails, unaware of the surreal truth that my Sky — our Sky — has been commandeered.

Before February 2008 I saw the pluming trails as odd and artful. Suddenly my innocence was slashed as I watched a pluming grid of trails [see photos on next page] intentionally laid down in the early morning Sky. In less than 40 minutes the pluming trails expanded and combined to veil the rising Sun.

My sense of violation was so strong that I immediately phoned my legislators and the media to ask what was going on. I expected them to share my indignation. Neither would even countenance my concern. I quickly learned that those who see this desecration of the Sky and try to expose it are conveniently marginalized as "conspiracy theorists." As many of us have learned over the decades, today's "theory" is tomorrow's fact.

Not one to be marginalized for long, I began to organize "Sky" meetings and to research and chronicle the daily phenomena.

Thanks to all of the investigative work already done by Rosalind Peterson of www.californiaskywatch.com and www.agriculturedefensecoalition.org, I had only to catch up. The documents quoted in this article are the ones that have most shaped my perspective and my actions.

In recent months governmental agencies have made our job a little easier by publicizing some blatantly insane activities.

On September 19th, the Navy and NASA sent a sounding rocket into the atmosphere over the Atlantic Ocean and released a "cloud" of charged aluminum oxide particles so they could study artificially-created, noctilucent "clouds" and other effects. They called this CARE, the Charged Aerosol Release Experiment.

Paul Bernhardt is the principal investigator for the Navy's Research Lab in Washington, D.C. In a September 21, 2009 article by Rachel Courtland in *New Scientist Magazine*, Mr. Bernhardt stated, "The CARE experiment could also pave the way for future launches that would use the uppermost part of the Earth's atmosphere as a large physics laboratory for studying charged dust." Some of us take exception to our atmosphere being exploited as a playground for Dr. Strangelove clones.

Then on October 9, with amazing arrogance, NASA "bombed" the Moon, ostensibly to force from the impact a dust plume which might contain frozen water droplets. Setting aside for a moment the sheer audacity of such an action — as though NASA (or the U.S.) owns the Moon — we note that, once again, NASA is interested in creating a "dust plume." Did NASA also "charge" this one, as it did the CARE package?

In an October 30, 2009, MSNBC article by Miguel Llanos,

titled "Willing to give up blue skies for climate fix? Geo-engineering gets closer look as a 'Plan B' in case emissions don't fall." He states that, "A new study describes pros and cons of cooling Earth via a thin cloud of aerosols. Techniques cited to do that are...artillery cannons, a miles-long tower, military aircraft and stratospheric balloons."

Did he say "military aircraft?" That is not a future plan. "Plan B" is being used every day, all around the globe to veil the Sky and dim the Sun. Called by NASA "Persistent Jet Contrails," these intentional, pluming trails are commonly called Chem-trails.

While NASA insists that these pluming jet trails are the exhaust of commercial jets there is ample evidence to refute this assertion. We do, however, agree with NASA that Persistent Jet Contrails are detrimental as they combine to veil the Sky and occlude the Sun. They hold heat against the planet and they dim the Sun. These are two of the major concerns in climate change discussions and yet Persistent Jet Contrails — which could be eliminated from the Sky's woes — will not even be on the table at the December, 2009 summit in Copenhagen.

"Why not?" you may ask. NASA and other government agencies do not admit to the use of this geo-engineering technique. And yet, thousands of us witness and document the pluming trails that veil our Sky — everyday and all around the planet.

If we set aside, for the moment, the "unintended consequences" of such wholesale methods, is it possible that Persistent Jet Contrails are intended to be helpful? Could they be the "Sunshield" recommended by Edward Teller before his death in 2003, intended to defend Earth from the Sun's burning rays? If this program is benevolent why does our government assert that the trails are only "commercial jet contrails under certain atmospheric conditions?" It's important, I think, to remem-

ber that Teller is also the Father of the Hydrogen Bomb.

Is Dr. Teller's final solution also U.S. Patent 5,003,186— March 26, 1991: The "Stratospheric Welsbach seeding for reduction of global warming," assignee: Hughes?

Aircraft Company? In this patent "a method is described for reducing atmospheric or global warming resulting from the presence of heat-trapping gases in the atmosphere, i.e., from the greenhouse effect. Such gases are relatively transparent to sunshine but absorb strongly the long-wavelength infrared radiation released by the Earth."

Is this the method people are witnessing daily and globally? If so, where was the public debate? When was our permission given for a program that admits to "seeding" our Sky with aluminum oxide, thorium oxide or other Welsbach-like material.

These are materials characterized by wavelength-dependent emissivity or reflectivity, having high emissivities in the visible and far-infrared wavelength regions and low emissivity in the near-infrared wavelength region in particle sizes from ten to one hundred microns. Once the tiny particles have been dispersed into the atmosphere, the particles may remain in suspension for up to one year. Then what?

Please consider the following U.S. Patents, as well, which — if in use — could be what we witness and could contribute to the alarming rise in Alzheimer's, Asthma and Autism.

U.S. Patent 5,360,162 — November 1, 1994: "Method and composition for precipitation of atmospheric water. Abstract: A method for precipitating atmospheric water by means of multi-component aerosols, including iodide-based, complex, multi-component, aerosol compositions. The compositions comprise a solid mass formed by a compacted mixture of silver iodide and the iodides, iodates and peri-

odates of alkali metals, lead, copper, barium; ammonia, barium chromate and selected oxidizers such as ammonium perchlorate and fuels such as poly-p-phenylene, phenol formaldehyde resin, epoxide resin and shellac and mixtures thereof. The compositions, upon burning, produce an aerosol effective to promote atmospheric water precipitation."

U.S. Patent 3,899,144 — August 12, 1975: "Powder contrail generation. Abstract: Light-scattering pigment powder particles [can be titanium dioxide, colloidal silica and silica gel], surface treated to minimize inparticles cohesive forces, are dispensed from a jet mill deagglomerator as separate single particles to produce a powder contrail having maximum visibility or radiation scattering ability for a given weight material."

U.S. Patent RE29,142 — February 22, 1977: "Combustible compositions for generating aerosols, particularly suitable for cloud modification and weather control and aerosolization process. Abstract: A combustible composition for generating aerosols for the control and modification of weather conditions consisting of a readily oxidizable substance selected from the group consisting of aluminum, magnesium, alkali-metals and alkaline Earth metals..."

There are many patents which are unregulated and may be used in combination without research concerning their individual or combined effects on our atmosphere and the natural systems of Earth.

Add to these the use of satellites to "modify" our atmosphere as in:

U.S. Patent 5,762,298 — June 9, 1998: "Use of artificial satellites in Earth orbits adaptively to modify the effect that solar radiation would otherwise have on Earth's weather."

U.S. Patent 5,984,239 — November 16, 1999: "Weather modification by artificial satel-

lites." This brings us to a discussion of the admitted use of our atmosphere for military purposes, again without public awareness or permission and without research into synergistic effects.

For example, this (from the U.S. Air Force Web site) does deserve our attention: "Chaff and flares [and it is the chaff we are most interested in for purposes of this article] are defensive countermeasures used on aircraft to confuse radar- and heat-seeking missiles. Chaff is used as a decoy for radar-seeking missiles and is made of glass silicate fibers with an aluminum coating. These fibers are approximately 60% glass fiber and 40% aluminum by weight. The typical Air Force RR-188 chaff bundle contains about 150 grams of chaff or about 5 million fibers. The fibers are 25 microns in diameter and typically 1 to 2 centimeters in length. In 1997, the Air Force used about 1.8 million bundles worldwide."

It seems fair to conclude, given the many government aerosol programs, that there is a lot of aluminum falling on us and on the Earth's soil and water systems.

In the U.S. Air Force's 1996 white paper, titled "2025," they assert that the Air Force intends to "own the weather in 2025." On page 37 of the executive summary it states, "Weather as a Force Multiplier: Owning the Weather in 2025: In 2025, the U.S. aerospace forces can 'own the weather,' as they 'own the night' now... Weather modification offers both the commercial sector and the military greatly enhanced capabilities...Weather modification will become a part of domestic and international security and could be done unilaterally, through alliance networks — particularly regional ones — or through an ad hoc coalition or a UN framework... the ability to generate precipitation, fog and storms on Earth or

to modify space weather, improve communications through ionospheric modifications [this most likely means H.A.A.R.P., which we'll get to shortly], and the production of artificial weather..."

On page 36 of the same document they promote the "Incapacitate: The Strings of the Puppet Master" including C2 attack: "command and control." This paper argues for "subtle manipulation of human perception as a dominant characteristic of C2 attack in 2025..." These technologies enable the development of the Incapacitate (pronounced, in-ka-pass-attack), a multi-component system that provides commanders with a range of attack options that can be used singly or in combination to influence an opponent, much as a puppet master manipulates the strings of a marionette...[including] a constellation of distributed mini-satellites, uninhabited aerial vehicles, 'micro-know-bots' and a holographic projection capability [which is described in the previous paragraph as the "creation of synthetic environments that an adversary thinks are real"].

The Air Force's "2025" can be read as a companion piece to the 1990 HAARP executive summary which references C2, C3, C4 capabilities. C3 — "satellite command, control and communications systems must be responsive enough to position satellites in correct orbits to support the theater commander... Theater commanders require reliable, timely support from space to maximize their war-fighting potential. This includes communications, navigation, weather, missile launch warning, interdiction and data transfer." All this "to ensure that the U.S. maintains space dominance."

It's no wonder that Representative Dennis Kucinich (D-Ohio), a rare voice for sanity, proposed the "Space Preservation Act of 2001" which was introduced into the House of Representatives in October 2001, less than a month after the fall of the twin towers.

This bill (HR 2977) states its purpose is, "To preserve the cooperative, peaceful uses of space for the benefit of all humankind by permanently prohibiting the basing of weapons in space by the United States and to require the President to take action to adopt and implement a world treaty banning space-based weapons."

The content of this Bill is an authoritative exposition of military capabilities. Although HR 2977 was not passed into law it does neatly delineate the "arsenal," as follows here.

"In this Act:

(1) The term 'space' means all space extending upward from an altitude greater than 60 kilometers above the surface of the Earth and any celestial body in such space.

(2)(A) The terms 'weapon' and 'weapons system' means a device capable of any of the following:

(i) damaging or destroying an object (whether in outer space, in the atmosphere or on Earth) by:

(I) firing one or more projectiles to collide with that object;

(II) detonating one or more explosive devices in close proximity to that object;

(III) directing a source of energy (including molecular or



atomic energy, subatomic particle beams, electromagnetic radiation, plasma or extremely low frequency (ELF) or ultra low frequency (ULF) energy radiation) against that object; or

(IV) any other unacknowledged or as yet undeveloped means.

(ii) Inflicting death or injury on or damaging or destroying, a person (or biological life, bodily health, mental health or physical and economic well-being of a person):

(I) through the use of any of the means described in clause (i) or subparagraph (B);

(II) through the use of land-based, sea-based or space-based systems using radiation, electromagnetic, psychotronic, sonic, laser or other energies directed at individual persons or targeted populations for the purpose of information war, mood management or mind control of such persons or populations; or

(III) by expelling chemical or biological agents in the vicinity of a person.

(2)(B) Such terms include exotic weapons systems such as:

(i) electronic, psychotronic or information weapons;

(ii) chemtrails;

(iii) high-altitude, ultra-low-frequency weapons systems;

(iv) plasma, electromagnetic, sonic or ultrasonic weapons;

(v) laser weapons systems;

(vi) strategic, theater, tactical or extraterrestrial weapons; and

(vii) chemical, biological, environmental, climate, or tectonic weapons.

(2)(C) The term 'exotic weapons systems' includes weapons designed to damage space or natural ecosystems (such as the ionosphere and upper atmosphere) or climate, weather and tectonic systems with the purpose of inducing damage or destruction upon a target population or region on Earth or in space."

Thank you, Representative Kucinich, for including this (2)

(C) potential, which is realized in the form of HAARP, the Department of Defense's High-frequency Active Auroral Research Program. While the 1990 document makes it seem a mere gleam-inits-mother's-eye, it is — in 2009 — fully operational with capabilities which are disturbing enough for peaceful research but terrifying when applied to the arena of war.

Indeed, the Earth's atmosphere itself has been commandeered and fortified for martial purposes, including manipulation of the Polar Electrojet and the Jet Stream, which regulates our U.S. continental weather.

Written by the Air Force Geophysics Laboratory and the Navy Office of Naval Research under the auspice of the Joint Services Program Plans and Activities, the Table of Contents includes "Potential Applications, Geophysical Probing, Generation of ELF/VLF Waves, Generation of Ionospheric Holes/Lens, Electron Acceleration, Generation of Field Aligned Ionization, Oblique HF Heating and Generation of Ionization Layers Below 90Km." (ELF is Extremely Low Frequency radio waves. VLF is Very Low Frequency.)

There are at least two patents which form the basis for HAARP. In 1977, U.S. Patent 4,042,196: "Method and apparatus for triggering a substantial change in Earth characteristics and measuring Earth changes" and in 1987 U.S. Patent 4686605: "Method and apparatus for altering a region of the Earth's atmosphere, ionosphere and/or magnetosphere."

There are several known HAARP antenna arrays around the world. The U.S. has two in Alaska and one in Puerto Rico. It is speculated there may be as many as twenty such arrays worldwide. The HAARP installation in Gakona, Alaska is said to contain 34 acres of 130 antennae which are capable of directing electromagnetic energy with

such intensity that it can "lift" the ionosphere.

And why, you might ask, would we want to "lift the ionosphere," like lifting the skirts of Heaven? "To deflect an incoming rocket." So said HAARP's public educator when interviewed in the documentary "Holes in Heaven?"

Our discussion would be incomplete without the "Bioeffects of Selected Nonlethal Weapons." This is the title of an Army document which was declared unclassified in December 2006 as part of the Army's response to a Freedom of Information Act request. The document lists among the "nonlethal effectors:" Laser and Other Light Phenomena, Radiofrequency-Directed Energy and "Aural bioeffects."

The contents of this document dovetail neatly with the intentions of "2025" and "HAARP." It discusses in detail the "Incapacitating Effects" that can be caused by Microwave Heating; Microwave Hearing; Disruption of Neural Control, Acoustic Energy and Laser-Induced Biological Effects. The details include Biological Target/Normal Function/Disease State, Mechanism to Produce the Desired Effects, Technological Status of Generator/Aiming Device, Range, Time to Onset, Duration of Effect and Recovery/Safety.

While these documents appear to be recent, the roots of these weapons are deep in the terrain of World War II and, indeed, deep in the insanity of the human species. The book *Tomorrow's Weapons* by Brig. Gen. J.H. Rothschild, U.S.A. (retired) was published in 1964. He argues for "The morality of toxic warfare" and its "place...in the nuclear age." The book's Appendix includes Properties of Chemical Agents, Some Diseases of Possible Interest and a Description of Principal Diseases of Biological Warfare Interest." It is interesting to note that distribution of these diseases is primarily

by "Aerosol," although other means include water, food, fomites and, notably, for those of us suffering the plague of Lyme Disease, insects.

It is natural to ask why our government would want to "practice" on us and yet there is a long, deplorable history of such practice. A courageous journalist, Dana Davis, wrote a series of articles for *The Asheville Tribune* (North Carolina). He was not able to complete the series, as advertisers threatened to pull their copy, but the research he did accomplish is both laudable and revelatory. In his third article on "contrails," dated August 18, 1999 Mr. Davis writes:

"The *Tribune* has conducted extensive research in trying to attain hard evidence leading to any information that could substantiate claims and theories related to chemtrails [what NASA calls Persistent Jet Contrails] being laid in the wake of military planes in the guise of condensation trails.

"Parties on both sides of the fence are entrenched that their view is the correct one in this controversial debate. Chemtrail believers consist mainly of the 'average Joe' and amateur sky watchers, while those who refute chemtrails, arguing that the cirrus formations are harmless contrails, consist primarily of physicists, NASA researchers and other scientists.

"But a lack of information relating to 'chemtrails' is not enough to deny their existence. Are the lingering contrails, in fact, normal? Have they always been synonymous with jet travel in certain climatic conditions? Is it customary for military planes to fly very close side by side and leave trails behind to form cross-hatch patterns across the nation?"

"In Executive Order 13128 [June 25, 1999] [President] Clinton stated that disclosure of such military information would not be permitted if it were 'contrary

to national security or law enforcement needs.'

"In Part I of the Contrail series we reported how, according to U.S. Code, the U.S. government may use human subjects for testing of [sic] biological agents in the event of one of these three circumstances:

1) Any peaceful purpose that is related to a medical, therapeutic, pharmaceutical, agricultural, industrial or research activity;

2) Any purpose that is directly related to protection against toxic chemicals or biological weapons and agents;

3) Any law enforcement purpose, including any purpose related to riot control.

"Executive Order 13128 falls under the category of the last two exceptions.

"One curious piece of information, learned in our investigation, is the establishment of a 'FLU Clinical Study' in Phoenix, Arizona. A 1-800 number was established soliciting residents to contact the clinic if they experienced certain symptoms, within a certain time frame. During this same time frame numerous 'sky-watchers' reported extensive contrail formations above the region. [Although this is anecdotal, I've chosen to include it.]

"When we called the number in June, a recording stated that the clinical study had been discontinued but referred people to www.igotflu.com. Upon accessing the 'IGotFlu' Web site we learned that it was a project of Roche Pharmaceuticals. Roche Pharmaceuticals is on the leading edge of bioresearch and is one of the organizations that registered numerous 'hits' onto various 'contrail' Web sites . . . (As of press time, we were unable to reenter the 'IGotFlu' Web site.)

After reading Part III of Dana Davis's series I phoned *The Asheville Tribune*, hoping to speak with him. I was told that Mr. Davis no longer works for the paper. Still, his courage and his contribution move me farther along, just as I hope this article moves others to research, to inquire, to trust their own intuition and to assert that the Sky Belongs to All of Us!

There are many who see what is going on and choose to act anonymously — or not at all. Some of us are clear that it was wrong in Germany, in the 1930s and '40s, to "look the other way." We say with confidence that we'll do better when our turn comes. Well, our turn is here. Only this time they may just be bringing the "showers" to us, rather than loading us onto the trains. We won't know for sure until it's too late.

Of necessity, I have ranged far and wide in this exposition. The issues themselves range far and wide. Nefarious practices are in effect around the Earth and high into its once-protective and sustaining atmosphere. The truth is withheld from us, is veiled as surely as is our once-blue Sky.

As, daily, we grow more drowsy, we forget that weather once was an expression of the love affair between Earth and Sky. My fury soothes my trepidation as I throw off the cloak of anonymity. Please join me.

Please be among those who at least tried to bring awareness to other humans — as our own awareness grows.


HAARP Cartoon



On Catching the Light

Blue skies and brittle cold at Myrtle Point that day. Threading my way past twisted stalks of sea oats, with the stubble of marsh grass underfoot. The small surf cascading along the beach in falling dominos of sound. Mesmerized by the sparkling strokes of sun's pen crosshatched on water's crumpled surface. Dazed by a shimmering ribbon of wet sand curled along the shoreline. Glimmering motes of seedstuff in the air. Glistening insect wings. Flashing filaments of spidersilk anchored to the bushes, floating in the breeze, invisible except in this one shining moment, when, just so, they catch the light.

Then I saw them, freshly minted by the ebbing tide. I picked up one, then another: glistening pebbles like frosted glass. I couldn't fathom why, but I had to have more, so I ran that day up and down the beach, rejecting anything solidly white, plucking up anything translucent, stuffing my coat pockets, hurrying home with my treasures, and it's only as I write that understanding dawns: carbonic acid in the water has leached away their salts. Once opaque, these stones have offered their very substance to the river. Now they are transparent bearers of the light.

But the days grow darker. Light is ebbing, like the tide. One of my stones is oval, another, round. Earth's axis of rotation is 23.5 degrees off vertical. As she treads her elliptical path

around the sun, she points first her northern then her southern hemisphere toward it. Starting June 21st, the sun loses altitude in our noontime sky and this inexorable progression of shortening days and lengthening nights climaxes on December 21st, the winter solstice, the "sun still" day, when our star halts its southbound journey and turns north once more so that light, like the tide, can flow forth again.

Ignorant of Earth's tilt and the science of rotation, our ancestors were frightened this time of year. What if the sun keeps going? What if it never comes back? Amidst all this spinning and tilting the losses keep coming, the griefs pile up, and what are we in an ocean of trouble but small stones scraping in an ineluctable tide?

Rejoice, I say, and rejoice again, because in this briny swash and backwash our opaque substance wears away, making us, with every day that passes, more translucent.

Einstein himself said light is a mystery. It is pure energy interfacing with matter at its electrical and magnetic levels. The sun is our primary light source but the arena of interaction which scientists call electromagnetic radiation occurs in and around all objects, including you and me.

What if we go one step further than Einstein, and use another word for light: love. Isn't that pure energy? Doesn't love interface with matter at, shall we say, the highest level? So rejoice, I say, and rejoice again, because the tiniest act of kindness is a radiant force, invisible except in the one shining moment when, just so, we catch the light.

Monkey Business: Better Business Practices Learned Through Monkeys Do or Don't Do

"Jackie, may I see your baby?" She picks up one of her beloved stuffed animals, brings it a little closer to me and begins to groom it. She treats it with such care that we believe she is caring for the little one that she never had. She will talk to it like a mama talks to her baby. She is not speaking in any human language, of course. Jackie is a Vervet Gue-non monkey. But it is clear that she is communicating and clear that she is answering my request.

"Gizmo, will you come outside and let me say hello?" I can hear his TV on in the comfort of his climate-controlled indoor/outdoor enclosure. Within seconds, I see him open the flap to his tunnel and he comes outside. It is clear to me that Gizmo answered my request. Gizmo is a Rhesus Macaque monkey.

"Nikki, will you come over and let me say hello?" She (a female Gothic Squirrel monkey) makes no move to come closer or acknowledge me with eye contact. If she had given a glance in my direction, I would have thought 'maybe she is thinking about it, but is not yet fully committed. Perhaps she is trying.' But she was clear. She was not answering my request.

In each case above, their answer was clear. They either honored my request or they did not. When we as humans have a request or an invitation made of us, we have a third answer that is very over-used — "I'll try." It's a cop-out, a non-commitment and often used to blow someone off because you don't want to hurt their feelings by saying "No."

However, people more often get disappointed when you say you will "try" and then don't accomplish what was asked of you.

In her article "I'll Try Doesn't Fly!" Cookie Tuminello, The Team Builder of the South, Founder of Success Source, LLC (www.CookieTuminello.com) has this to say about the use of the word "try:"

"How many times a day do you hear yourself or others use the phrase, 'I'll try . . . to get this project done' or 'I'll try . . . to come to the meeting?' I cringe every time I hear it. My clients,

however, know that saying, "I'll try" does not fly with me. Here are three thoughts that come up for me when someone says, "I'll try." Are you afraid to commit, afraid to say NO or afraid you won't succeed so you want to leave a back door open just in case?

"By copping out and using the "I'll try" response, you're admitting that you aren't committed to doing the necessary work to be the person you want to be in your life. When you live your life mired in mediocrity, you get mediocre results."

One of the most famous lines from Jedi Master Yoda in "Star Wars V: The Empire Strikes Back" was when he asked young Luke Skywalker to remove his spacecraft from the swamp even though it looked impossible. Skywalker, quite skeptical, said "I'll try." Master Yoda was quick to teach and replied rather sternly. "Do or Do Not Do. There is no Try."

Sure, there are times when it may be appropriate to use the word "try." If you are asked to taste a food you have never eaten before, you might say, "Sure, I'll try a piece." If you are asked to do something that is outside of your expertise or comfort zone, such

as Bungee Jumping, and you say, "Sure, I'll give it a try," you are just letting the person know that you are a beginner, not practiced, but are willing to take the challenge. You know the difference between the "taking the challenge" try and the "I'm blowing you off try."

I invite you to notice with me how often you are tempted to use "try" and instead substitute something else. 



In fact, the Chamber repeated that debatable number in the press release sent out announcing the lawsuit against us. Now that's chutzpa!



least a 10-cent loss."

So, I was right. Um, barely. Here's more.

While costs vary by location, the \$1 double cheeseburger typically costs franchisees at least \$1.10, said Dan Fitzpatrick, a Burger King franchisee from South Bend, Indiana who is a spokesman for the association. That includes about 55 cents for the cost of the meat, bun, cheese and toppings. The remainder typically covers expenses such as rent, royalties and worker wages.


In the race to the bottom, it looks like Burger King may have won — they have found a meal so disgustingly cheap that it's actually not even profitable. That's scary. About as scary as knowing that the whole shebang actually really costs only \$1.10.

Every time I see a Burger King commercial advertising their \$1 double cheeseburgers I'm astounded. How the heck could that be possible? There is meat on there, right? Two patties? I mean it's likely pieces of thousands of feedlot cows and it has got other fillers in there. And usually some sort of chemical to try and kill the bacteria. And then there's the cheese — maybe something resembling a dairy product, the bun (which has over 30 ingredients, according to the Burger King Web site — I lost count) and of course a few wilted tomatoes or lettuce or pickles maybe? Hard to remember, last time I had a fast food burger I was 11.

And that's just the ingredients — of course there is also the labor, the packaging and the other associated costs.

So how could it be remotely possible to do all of that — even at massive scale — for a buck? Well, it turns out you can't. According to the Associated Press, "The National Franchise Association, a group that represents more than 80 percent of Burger King's U.S. franchise owners, said the \$1 promotion forces restaurant owners to sell the quarter-pound burger with at



Safe Heat Project



It should be obvious to persons with a normal brain cell count that our money systems are self-destructing.

This means that in the near future we will be facing changes and shortages of many kinds. Aside from the usual need for water, food and shelter, we are going to need some economical way to keep our shelter heated. If we are outside the urban areas we can load up on a wood supply and have an efficient wood stove. If not, it may be time to think a — for when our usual heat sources get cut off.

I always have some extra LP gas containers around and if I crack my windows, can use one of the little unvented Mr. Heater units for emergencies. Kerosene stoves have been around for a hundred years and are still available but I shy away from them because the fuel is contaminated with Beryllium. According to some researchers, this winds up in the brain and attracts parasites.

The ideal heat of course is from electricity. Unfortunately, this can be a bit spendy in



bulbs can be found in any hardware store, it seemed logical to me that it wouldn't be any great feat to make up some smaller wattage heaters for very little outlay in money. I soon rounded up some copper sheeting from a local scrap metal buyer (\$2 a pound), some little 12-volt fans and transformers from an electrical supply outfit (less than \$5 each) and the bulb and stovepipe hardware from our hardware store.

Several experimental designs worked well and in these illustrations the general configuration should be clear enough to copy. Having only a 250-watt bulb, these units can't heat larger rooms by themselves but they can keep the chill off most areas and, used in multiples, get as much heat as required.

One of the larger electronics suppliers of small fans and 12-volt transformers is All Electronics at 800-826-5432. The small 12-volt fans will blow just the right amount of hot air out of the heated copper baffles. As with any project like this, a certain amount of common sense and experimentation is helpful.

many areas. A few years ago it was found that copper baffles in heaters made the heat spread out more evenly and gave more efficiency. Overnight, wood-enclosed, infra-red heaters hit the market with large efficiency claims and matching price tags. Since lower wattage infra-red heating


The spending review committee established by Japan's new Prime Minister, Yukio Hatoyama, has recommended that funding for the Overseas Fishery Cooperation Foundation (OFCF) be cancelled after 2010.

The OFCF is the largest financier of the Tokyo-based Institute of Cetacean Research,

which runs the Japanese whaling program. The whaling fleet usually sails for the Southern Ocean in mid-November, hunting whales for scientific research regardless of a moratorium on commercial whaling set by the International Whaling Commission in 1986.

The spending review committee has recommended that the Overseas Fisheries Cooperation Fund have all of its funding revoked, except monies needed for loans in 2010.

The OFCF claims it needs 70.4 billion yen (US\$780 million) for various programs, most likely including whaling, in 2010...

the same rate, masking surface mass losses for nearly a decade.

Moreover, a significant part of the additional meltwater refroze in the cold snowpack that covers the ice sheet. Without these moderating effects, Bamber explained, post-1996 Greenland mass loss would have been double the amount of mass loss observed now.

Scientists from NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory and from the Department of Earth

System Science, University of California, Irvine are co-authors on the study along with scientists from three Dutch institutions: the Institute for Marine and Atmospheric Research at Utrecht University, the Delft Institute of Earth Observation and Space Systems at the Delft University of Technology and the Royal Netherlands Meteorological Institute.

The study is published in the current issue of the journal *Science*.

New CD Brings Mountains Into Our Hearts Raises Awareness About Mountaintop Removal

On behalf of Heartwood, I teamed up with Bloomington based singer/songwriter Jason Wilber, who is the guitar player for John Prine, to produce a compilation CD of music by nationally-known recording artists, including Willie Nelson (a previously unreleased version of Bob Dylan's "Blowin' in the Wind"), Bonnie Raitt, John Prine, Gillian Welch, Ralph Stanley, Natalie Merchant, Tom T. Hall, Kathy Mattea and others, to raise awareness about and help stop the tragedy of mountaintop removal coal-mining.

We have partnered with filmmakers Mari-Lynn Evans and Phylis Geller whose award winning documentary, "The Appalachians" was widely shown on PBS to produce the music CD as a companion piece to their new film, "Coal Country." The CD is called "Coal Country Music."

"Coal Country" has been accepted into several film festivals and was recently named the best film of the year at the West Virginia Film Festival. Coal Country was shown on the Discovery Channel's Planet Green Reel Impact series on November 14 and was released on DVD in



conjunction with the Coal Country Music CD, November 10th.

"Coal Country Music" includes liner notes by Ashley Judd and Woody Harrelson and information about the Alliance for Appalachia. All proceeds from the sale of the CD will be used to support the work of the Alliance for Appalachia, of which Heartwood is a member, and be used to STOP mountaintop removal coal-mining.

The following quote from actor Woody Harrelson which appears on the CD describes what's at stake:

"Mountaintop removal is the most devastating peacetime activity in human history — in fact, if the destruction to our nation's natural and cultural heritage were being perpetrated by a

foreign power, it would be considered an act of war — because in a very real sense, it is — it is a war against the Earth. Every week, mountaintop removal coal-mining detonates more explosive force on the land and the communities of Appalachia than the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima to extract the coal that is warming the planet and poisoning the water, air and land.

"The artists on this musical compilation are dedicated, as I am, to ending this unsustainable and ultimately suicidal practice and to promoting renewable energy alternatives and the green jobs they will create. Won't you please join them?"

The Appalachian Mountains are considered the oldest moun-

tain chain on Earth and the forest they harbor is the oldest and most biologically diverse hardwood forest in this hemisphere. The Appalachian forests were the seed source for the hardwood forest of the eastern United States after the retreat of the great inland sea and later the advent and retreat of the glaciers.

In addition, Appalachian folk culture has been the source of so much of our nation's musical and cultural heritage. Both the land and the culture are worthy of our best efforts to protect and preserve for future generations.



U.S. Record High Temperatures Double Record Lows Since 2000

BOULDER, Colorado, November 12, 2009 (ENS, excerpt) — Daily record high temperatures occurred twice as often as record lows over the last decade across the continental United States, according to new research released today.

"Climate change is making itself felt in terms of day-to-day weather in the United States," says Gerald Meehl, lead author of the study and a senior scientist at the National Center for Atmospheric Research. "The ways these records are being broken show how our climate is already shifting."

The ratio of record highs to lows is likely to increase in coming decades if emissions of greenhouse gases continue to climb, he says.

If temperatures were not warming, the number of record daily highs and lows being set each year would be about even.

Instead, for the period from January 1, 2000 to September 30, 2009, the continental United States set 291,237 record highs and 142,420 record lows, as the country experienced unusually mild winter weather and intense summer heat waves.

The study, by authors at NCAR, Climate Central, The Weather Channel and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, has been accepted for publication in the journal *Geophysical Research Letters*. It was funded by the National Science Foundation, NCAR's sponsor, the Department of Energy

and Climate Central.

"If the climate weren't changing, you would expect the number of temperature records to diminish significantly over time," says Claudia Tebaldi, a statistician with Climate Central who is one of the paper's co-authors.

"As you measure the high and low daily temperatures each year, it normally becomes more difficult to break a record after a number of years. But as the average temperatures continue to rise this century, we will keep setting more record highs," Tebaldi predicts.

A record daily high means that temperatures were warmer on a given day than on that same date throughout a weather station's history.

The authors used a quality-control process to ensure the reliability of data from thousands of weather stations across the country, while looking at data over the past six decades to capture longer-term trends.

This decade's warming was more pronounced in the western United States, where the ratio was more than two to one, than in the eastern United States, where the ratio was about 1.5 to one.

The study also found that the two-to-one ratio across the country as a whole could be attributed more to a comparatively small number of record lows than to a large number of record highs.

This indicates that much of the nation's warming is occurring at night, when temperatures are dipping less often to record lows. This finding is consistent

with years of climate model research showing that higher overnight lows should be expected with climate change.

Meehl and his co-authors also used a sophisticated computer model of global climate to see how record high and low temperatures are likely to change by 2100.

If nations continue to increase their emissions of greenhouse gases in a business-as-usual scenario, the U.S. ratio of daily record high to record low temperatures would increase to about 20-to-1 by mid-century and 50-to-1 by 2100.

The mid-century ratio could be much higher if emissions rose at an even greater pace, or it could be about 8-to-1 if emissions were reduced significantly, the model showed.

The authors caution that such predictions are, by their nature, inexact. They point out that climate models are not designed to capture record daily highs and lows with precision and it remains impossible to know future human actions that will determine the level of future greenhouse gas emissions.

The model used for the study, the NCAR-based Community Climate System Model, correctly captured the trend toward warmer average temperatures and the greater warming in the West but overstated the ratio of record highs to record lows in recent years . . .

I go back to work with my vision and I drink down the bitter and sweet.


I know as you hear such a dream, friend, you will not pass it along;

self for whatever reason unable or unwilling to take the offensive, your talents are still needed. I think often of the military tactic called Hammer and Anvil, used most famously by Robert E. Lee at the battle of Chancellorsville. Lee kept Anderson's and McLaws's divisions in place while sending Stonewall Jackson's corps around the enemy's flank to crush that part of the opposing army between Jackson's hammer and Anderson's and McLaws's anvil. Both parts — offense and defense — were, and are, necessary.

At another talk, this one last fall, a man asked a question I'd never heard before: "If ten thousand people lined up ready to do your bidding, what would you say to them?"

My answer was immediate: "I'd tell them sure as hell not to listen to me."

His was just as fast: "That's a cop-out. How many dams could ten thousand people take down? People know how bad things are but they don't know what to do. They want to be told. That's your responsibility. What's the purpose of writing if you don't tell us what to do?"

I shot back: "Instead of telling me what hypo-

thetical readers want, tell me what you want."

"Tell me —"

"Do you want me to tell you —"

"— Yes —"

"— what to do?"

He nodded, then said, "You've had more time."

"Okay," I said. "Tomorrow, go to Barton Springs" — Barton Springs are a set of defining, and critically imperiled, springs in Austin, huge and beautiful, dying before the eyes of those who live there and love them — "and sit."

"Then what?"

"Wait until the springs tell you what to do."

"Why won't you —"

"I just did. Barton Springs know this region much better than I. They know what this region needs, know what sustainability looks and feels like here. The springs are much smarter than I am. They'll tell you exactly what to do."

Somebody else asked, "Is it Barton Springs?"

"Yes," I said, "And no. It's everywhere. Just listen. Not to me. To yourself. And to the land."
